José Hernández - Answer Key

Use the text to answer each question below.

1. José Hernández is a Mexican American astronaut who was born in California in 1962. Hernández’s parents were migrant farmworkers. During his early childhood, Hernández split his time between California and Mexico. Each March, his family would travel from Mexico to California to pick fruits and vegetables. They would work their way from Southern California to Northern California until December. His family would return to Mexico for three months until it was time to start the cycle again. José and his siblings worked alongside their parents on weekends during the school year and seven days a week in the summer. Although his parents stressed the importance of education, the constant moving made it hard for Hernández to keep up in school.

2. Eventually, Hernández and his family moved to Stockton, California full time. This allowed Hernández to focus on his schoolwork and improve his ability to speak English. As a senior in high school, Hernández was working in a field when he heard on the radio that Franklin Chang-Díaz had been selected to become an astronaut. The first Hispanic American astronaut ever, someone who looked like him, was going to space. He felt closer to his dream than ever before. Hernández graduated high school and enrolled at the University of the Pacific. He earned a degree in electrical engineering and a full scholarship to a graduate program at University of California, Santa Barbara.

In 2009, Hernández and the rest of the STS-128 crew completed a 14-day mission to the International Space Station. Today, Hernández runs an organization called Reaching for the Stars that helps inspire students to study STEM.
