On January 1st, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln issued the
enslaved people in the Confederate States were free. However, it took more than two years for many of those people to really be free.
That's because, in some areas under Confederate control, local leaders didn't implement the
The last state to do so was Texas. On June 19, 1865, 2,000 troops marched into the city of Galveston and enforced the Emancipation Proclamation. A quarter million Black people living in Texas were finally free.
From that day forward, June 19th—shortened to Juneteenth—became an annual day of , like an Independence Day for Black Americans. Today, we celebrate
Juneteenth—also called Day—by gathering with family and friends for cookouts and frieworks.
On June 17th, 2021, President Joe Biden declared Juneteenth a federal holiday. What do you think went into the decision to make Juneteenth a national holiday?
