Isn't that a little too hard for a woman?

If I were you, I probably wouldn't.

She tuned it out, wouldn't let 'em distract

Her from her dream, from her chosen path.

At age 20 she moved to the US,

Where she got an aerospace engineering masters

Degree, but she wouldn't stop.

Her imagination remained among the stars.

She got her doctorate, then NASA called,

Inviting her to participate in the astronaut				
Program. And three years later,				
Her dream became reality, not imagination,				
'Cause in November 1997				
She on her first mission,				
Orbiting Earth for 15 days.				
The first Indian woman to go to space.				
Her and her crew all made it home safely.				
Fast forward 'bout six years later,				
Chawla was picked for another journey:				
The Columbia Mission in 2003,				
Part two of her real-life dream.				
Seven on board, the mission was complete.				
But as the craft re-entered Earth's				
NASA was faced with its biggest fear.				
The Columbia disintegrated, broke apart—				
A disaster stemming from a broken part.				
Chawla and the whole crew died that day				
February 1st—a tragedy.				
To this day, Dr. Kalpana Chawla				
Remains a towering role model				
Who inspires others to imagine				
What could be, 'cause anything can happen.				
Her name's on schools and streets				
And satellites in space, where she'll always be.
