Lorraine Hansberry

Lorraine Hansberry
Today we're going to talk about Lorraine Hansberry…in just a minute.
Lorraine Hansberry was born in Chicago in 1930. Her father opened one of the city's first banks for Black
customers, and figures like W.E.B. Du Bois and Langston Hughes frequently visited
their home. When the family moved to a White neighborhood to challenge
the case went all the way to the Supreme Court, eventually helping to
ban housing
Hansberry moved to New York City in 1950, where she began writing and participating in civil rights
In 1959, Hansberry made history as the first Black woman to have a play on
Broadway. A Raisin in the Sun tells the story of a working-class Black family in Chicago, inspired in part by
Hansberry's upbringing. Later that year, Hansberry became the youngest and first Black playwright to
receive the New York Drama Critics' Circle Award. She went on to write and produce one more play before
she died of cancer at the age of 34, leaving behind several unfinished works that her ex-husband and creative
partner eventually published.
Though her career was brief, Hansberry opened the door for countless Black artists to make their own way
in the theater world.
