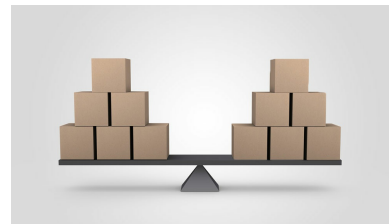

American Civil Rights Activist who refused to give up her seat on a bus in Montgomery Alabama in 1955, which was the beginning of the Montgomery Bus Boycott.

One of the most famous figures of the Civil Rights Movement, _Rosa Parks_ refused to give up a bus seat for a white passenger and inspired others to fight against unequal treatment.

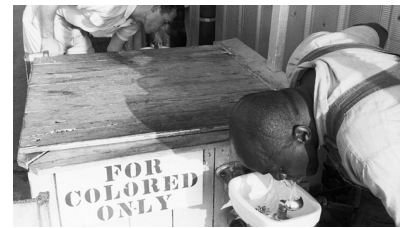
segregation]>
