Memorial Day

1. Yellow ribbons and red poppies are two symbols you might see on Memorial Day. The yellow ribbon's connection to Memorial Day is often linked to a song. "Tie a Yellow Ribbon Round the Old Oak Tree" was a hit song in the 1970s. Shortly after the song came out, it became popular to tie ribbons around trees. This is done as a sign of remembrance for fallen soldiers or as a celebration of soldiers coming home. The tradition of wearing red poppies comes from the poem "In Flanders Fields" by John McCrae. It was written in 1915 during World War I. The poem describes poppies growing on graves. The poppy is used as a symbol of remembrance in more than 50 other countries, too.

On Memorial Day, yellow ribbons and red poppies are both
