Like many other tribes, we suffered at The hands of Europeans and the US government. The Spanish came to conquer the region, Years later, we helped the Pueblo defeat them. But the Spanish returned, and the battles raged, Back and forth we fought, many Navajo enslaved. Then in 1863, the United States Wanted our land, so they decided to take it. They forced us to march 300 miles from home To a reservation in New Mexico. Many of us died on that Long Walk, Mass deportation, it's not small talk. And many other native tribes Were forcibly moved and lost their lives. And like the other tribes, we carried our culture: Woven rugs of hand-dyed colors, Intricate paintings from grains of sand That are swept away after a ceremony ends. Today, we're one of the largest native nations With 300,000 members, so I'm saying...
