

## The Statue of Liberty

Use the text to answer each question below.

1. The Statue of Liberty is a monument that stands in New York Harbor. It is on an island called Liberty Island. The statue was a gift to the US from France. In 1865, a French writer wanted to create a monument to celebrate the US. The writer's name was Édouard René de Laboulaye. He admired the US's independent stance. The US had been free from Great Britain for almost 100 years. In 1875, Frederic Auguste Bartholdi began to design the statue. It was modeled after the Roman goddess of freedom. A French architect helped Bartholdi build the statue. The architect's name was Alexandre Gustave Eiffel. He made sure the statue was strong enough to stay up for a long time. Meanwhile, builders in the US started to create a pedestal, or base, for the statue to stand on.

The outside is made of 300 sheets of copper. It was originally the color of a penny, but over time, air turns copper green. This is why the Statue of Liberty now looks green.

It arrived in New York Harbor in 1885. It took four months to put it back together on its new pedestal. On October 28, 1886, the Statue of Liberty was dedicated in front of a huge crowd. The statue stands near Ellis Island. Millions of immigrants passed through Ellis Island in the late 1800s. They came to the US for opportunities they did not have in their homelands. The statue was a symbol of hope to them.

They symbolize breaking free from oppression. On the base of the statue, there is a poem called "The New Colossus." It was written by Emma Lazarus. The poem is about welcoming people from other countries to the US.
