many people believed in Manifest Destiny, the belief that Americans had the divine right to contr	ol all the
land from the Atlantic to the Pacific Oceans.	
In 1862, the Pacific Railroad Act made it possible for two companies to begin building a transcon	tinental
railroad. The Central Pacific started in California and built eastward, while the Union Pacific bega	n in
Nebraska and built westward in a race to meet in the middle. Construction was difficult and dang	gerous, and
many workers were injured or died—especially Chinese, who	made up
much of the workforce.	
In 1869, the railroad was completed in Promontory, Utah. Now people and goods could cross the	uS in one
week.	
This was great news for and business and te	rible news
for the Native Americans who had lived on the land for generations. Construction of the railroad	and the
White settlers it brought to new territories escalated the ongoing	
of Indigenous people.
