
segregation]>

Social Darwinism]>

a 19th-century theory that held that society and groups of people are subject to the same laws of natural selection as animals and plants. It was used to justify racism and colonialism through its belief in racial superiority.

The nineteenth-century theory of _Social Darwinism_ led Europeans to think they had a duty to colonize Africa, Asia and South America because they were genetically superior to the native people living there.
