You are the Word Master!

For this project, you will “master” one of the new words.

Your handout should contain your FIRST AND LAST NAME, be neat and pleasing to the eye, and it should include these **6** sections in THIS ORDER:

1. **Various definitions** (with parts of speech) from Webster's New World dictionary (Mrs. R.'s slides) or Merriam Webster.
2. **Word Forms:** Different forms of the words and their parts of speech (with definitions if varied)
3. **Sentences:** At least two example sentences (using different parts of speech or different word forms). Make sure they are COMPLETE sentences. Do not write them yourself; get them from a dictionary.
4. **Multiple Wordmaster Categories:** other wordmaster words it relates to or can be grouped with (title each group) along with the parts of speech of each word listed (use the groupings doc we made in class for this)
5. **Word Associations:** the real life things your word is usually associated with when being used in context. Typical Uses/References. (example: *provisions* are usually associated with food, camping, and contracts). Vocabulary.com is a great resource for word associations!
6. **Analogies:** create two analogies using this word using correct analogy format (aligning parts of speech and word order in stem as well as answer choices).

Incoherent

Definitions:

Adjective

1. without logical or meaningful connection; disjointed; rambling
2. lacking unity or harmony of elements: *The president tried to unify the incoherent public.*
3. lacking physical **cohesion**; loose: *Incoherent dust scattered across the audiovisual room.*

Word Forms:

Cohere verb

1. to stick together; **adhere**; be united; hold fast, as parts of the same mass
2. to be naturally or logically connected: *Without sound reasoning, no argument will cohere.*
3. to agree; be congruous: *Her account of the incident cohered with his.*

Cohesion noun togetherness, unity

Coherent adjective

1. logically connected; consistent, understandable: *The debater delivered a coherent argument.*
2. sticking together: *His pocket contained a coherent mass of sticky candies.*

Incoherence/coherence nouns

Sentences:

1. *An incoherent sentence ruins the fluency of the story.*
2. *The particles of wet flour cohered to form a paste.*
